

From the Pastor's Desk

Palm Sunday was a joy-filled morning! One hundred and fifty participants at *Chapel on the Beach*, and another 150 at the *Worship in the Chapel* service, complete with lines of children and youth waving palm branches and dancing the grapevine to "The King of Glory Comes." The music was glorious and inspired.



Now we turn to the events of Holy Week following Jesus' entrance to Jerusalem. **Maundy Thursday** we will recreate the Last Supper as we join in conversations, fellowship, blessings, and betrayal. **Good Friday** at noon we will hear *The Seven Last Words of Christ* accompanied by Taizé music; a quiet and powerful noontime service.

And then... **Easter Sunday**, the Day of Resurrection. The stone is rolled away from the tomb. Christ is Risen Indeed! Alleluia! Colorful Easter dresses and baskets and chocolate; magnificent music capped off with Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus;" and festive Coffee Hour with Hot Cross Buns after worship. Together we receive and share the amazing grace of God that changes the world forevermore.

In light of the events of Holy Week, culminating in **Jesus' resurrection**, how then shall we live? How might it feel to truly live as **Easter people**?

In his book "Living the Resurrection," Eugene Peterson, author of the Biblical interpretation, *The Message*, writes that perhaps the most important thing we can do is simply keep our eyes open. Resurrection is not something we do or accomplish or control. It is God's work and God's way. But it surrounds us all the time. Our job is to see it in our midst— "cultivating wonder" by "stopping and being quiet long enough to see, open-eyed with wonder... sitting in open receptivity to what is beyond us, so that our souls are formed by what we cannot work up or take charge of. We respond and enter into what God continues to do."

Enjoy this newsletter; put activities on your calendar; plan to bring a friend or neighbor; ask an elder if they would like a ride to Sunday morning Christian Education and Worship, or Tuesday Men's Fellowship, or Wednesday Bible Study. And along the way this April, find times to be still, **to be open to God at work in your life**, and to cultivate wonder.

Alleluia! Christ is Risen Indeed!





of the Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church. "Happy Birthday" was sung during worship with the playing of a bagpipe. The celebration continued afterwards out on the pavilion deck with fellowship, birthday goodies and a oversized card signed by well wishers.
